I just happened to be in a certain camera store here a Parigi, when a man came in, obviously an American, and began to enquire to the clerk there if they would buy a Movie camera, a Bolex, from him. I pounced upon hearing that, said I was interested in buying a good movie camera, talked to him about it, found out the story behind it and the price, and the upshot was that I bought it this afternoon. The man seems to be a second-rate film maker, travel type or TV or something of that sort: anyway he never heard of Maya Deren, so you see he isn't much interested in the artistic angle. Anyway, he'd bought this camera 2nd hand in the USA before coming over here, had seen it gone over thoroughly in the Bolex factory, then soon after he got to Europe was in an Automobile accident which landed him in the hospital for sometime, with the result that he came out with no money, or not much, left, is obliged to sell his camera to have enough money to get home on. I have his address, saw his passport and all that and looked at the camera thoroughly, so I am sure he's honest and so on. I am amazed at the price, though: all that colored film alone would cost over 100 dollars, so that I'm paying around 250 dollars or so for the camera, which is in excellent condition!
